COLLEGE PROFILE

Government Arts and Science College Kondotty, popularly known as GASCK, was established in 2013 as per GO (M.S) No.565/13/H.E.D dated 17/08/2013 and is located in a lush green village called Vilayil-Parappur which is about 12 KMs away from Kondotty town and 15 KMs far from Calicut International Airport. Affiliated to the University of Calicut, the college offers five undergraduate (UG) and two postgraduate (PG) programs which include new generation job-oriented programs like BTHM and Functional English. Within a short span of time, the college could find its niche in academic, social, cultural and athletic domains due to the committed and concerted efforts of the teachers, students, administrative staff and the local community around. The AISHE code of the college is C-48450. The college was accredited with A grade by NAAC in December 2021 and has been recognized under 2(F) and 12 (B) of UGC act 1956.

The college has been offering UG programs in Functional English, Mathematics, Urdu, Commerce, and Tourism & Hotel Management since its inception in 2013. The Departments of English and Mathematics started offering PG programmes in 2018. The college is blessed with a peaceful, academic and intellectual culture which is highly conducive to knowledge dissemination, creativity augmentation and overall individual development of learners.

Within a short span of time, the college has made significant marks in the academic, social and cultural growth of the areas and communities around. The college NSS Unit is functioning very actively and was chosen as one of the best units at the State level for innovative works and services for the year 2018-19. The alumni of the college are either working/pursuing their higher studies in and outside the country. Since there are 15 higher secondary schools in the nearby areas, the college is a main hope for higher education for thousands of students passing out from these schools. The distinctive feature of the college is that girl students form the majority of the student community of this institution and this is the only government college in the state with the program, Bachelor of Tourism and Hotel Management (BTHM).

LOCATION

The campus is located in a remote village called Vilayil which is in Cheekode Panchayath, in Kondotty Taluk of Malappuram District, Kerala. The college is about 12 KMs away from Kondotty town and 15 kilometres from the Calicut International Airport. Kozhikode, the nearest major railway station to access the College, is about 32 Kilometres from the Campus.

COLLEGE EMBLEM

The college emblem consists of an open book, a pen, two elephants and eight stars. The open book and the pen symbolise the unrivalled position of reading and writing in acquiring and sharing

knowledge. The elephants stand for the power that knowledge is capable of infusing to the learner in multiple ways and means and the eight starts stand for the core values or skills that learners have to strive for in the process of pursuing their studies: systematism, commitment, perseverance, adaptability, scholarship, obedience, sociability, indebtedness.

HISTORY

As a bold step to further the right to and spread of education to the still side-lined sections in the society, the Government of Kerala in power in 2013, decided to set up Government Colleges in all Assembly Constituencies where there is no single Govt College. Mr. Mammed Unni Haji, the then MLA of Kondotty Constituency took commendable initiative to find free land in a suitable location for a centre of higher education in his constituency. When the local leaders like Mr. Gafoor Haji and Mr. Alavi Haji gave unparalleled support to bring the college to Vilayil, a village located at Cheekode Panchayath and the Vidya Poshani Educational Trust (VPET) donated the required land setting an imitable model for the posterity, a centre of higher education was established in a remote village to serve and realise educational dreams of many underprivileged villages around the locality.

The committee of Madharul-Uloom Higher Secondary Madrasa, Cheriaparamb did all the required arrangements and facilities to start the college in 2013 in its building and the college was functioning there till it shifted to its own campus in September, 2016. Dr. K Abdul Hameed, retired Principal, EMEA College of Arts and Science, Kondotty was the first Special Officer of the college. Then, Dr. AK Abdul Gafoor of Govt College, Meenchantha, was given additional charge of Special Officer till the appointment of the first Principal Prof. K Jayakumar in 2013. The college, since then, has had remarkable contributions to its tremendous growth from successive Principals like Dr. Kunheenkutty, Dr. Vasudevan Nair, Dr. Abdul Latheef (in charge) Dr. Laila, Dr. Elizabeth, Dr. Muhammed Rafeeqe, Dr. Haridasan , Dr. Krishnankutty. and Dr. AK Abdul Gafoor.

COLLEGE COUNCIL

The **College Council** consists of the Principal and Heads of the Department of each subject of study, two persons elected from the staff members, Librarian of the General Library and the Ministerial Head of Administrative Staff of the College Office. The Principal is the ex-officio President of the Council.

The Council is empowered to consider and report any questions concerning physical facilities, course of instruction, or rules of discipline referred to it by the Principal but it shall not interface in any manner with the general administration of the college which is vested in the Principal acting under the orders of the Director of Collegiate Education. All questions of promotion, term certificates and scholarships shall ordinarily be decided by the Council. All cases of serious misconduct on the part of students involving loss of their term certificates or their removal or expulsion from the College shall also be dealt with by the Principal, ordinarily in consultation with the College Council.

COLLEGE DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The CDC is a mandatory body which includes the District Collector as its Chairman and the Principal as Convener. Other members include the Vice President of PTA, the President of Alumni Association, Chairman of the College Union, the Executive Engineer of the PWD-Buildings Division and four persons nominated by the Director of Collegiate Education. The committee is responsible for identifying infrastructural requirements of the college on priority basis and utilising the funds available in matching grants heads. The committee also takes active role in assessing the overall needs of the college for ensuring quality in teaching and learning. The Committee has powers to accept donations from the public. The staffs of the college are also permitted to make collections towards the fund in the name of the “College Development Fund”. An amount equal to the funds raised by the Committee towards the college development fund will be given by the Government as grant.

The College is affiliated to the University of Calicut, Kerala. It follows the rules and regulations set by the University/Government in all matters related to admissions and conduct of the courses. Usually, the University announces the admission notification in June-July every year. COLLEGE LIBRARY

The college library has a comprehensive collection of books. The reference section has adequate collection in the domain of languages, science, Tourism and Hotel management, Commerce and management. The college library will be open on all days from 9.30 am to 4.30 pm except public holidays.

DRP

The present student community prefers screen reading to print reading and to cater to this preference, the college initiated a distinctive practice called Digital Resource Pool. This is a repository of e-books in each faculty members' collection, their study notes, video or audio lectures, etc and made available on the college website for students to access and download at their own convenience. These e-resource collections, grouped and labelled systematically, can be used by our students and other students because their links are provided in the college website, student WhatsApp groups and display boards in the form of hyperlinks or QR codes

N-LIST (e-resources)

The N-LIST project provides access to e-resources to students, researchers and faculty from colleges and other beneficiary institutions through server(s) installed at the INFLIBNET Centre. The authorized users from colleges can access e-resources and download articles required by them directly from the publisher's website once they are duly authenticated as authorized users through servers deployed at the INFLIBNET Centre. The college has subscribed to N-List and it opens up chances for the staff and students to access thousands of e-resources like e-books, journals and doctoral theses etc. To get user details, contact the college N-List Coordinator/the Librarian.

Moodle LMS

Modular Object-Oriented Dynamic Learning Environment (MOODLE) is designed to provide educators, administrators, and learners with an open, robust, secure and free platform to create and deliver personalized learning environments. It is a free and open-source learning management system (LMS) under the GNU General Public License. Developed on pedagogical principles, Moodle is used for blended learning, online education, flipped classroom and other e-learning projects across the globe. GASCK has its own customized version of Moodle known as GASCK LMS. It is well capacitated to meet the educational needs of its community of learners and teachers. Instructional practices like assignments, testing, attendance marking etc are fully done through this platform. Scheme for Earn to Learn (SEL)

SEL, an innovative initiative by the department of Tourism and Hotel Management, is started to support financially challenged students in the department to earn the money needed to meet their academic expenses by taking up part-time /weekend duties in leading five-star hotels or premium hospitality and event management firms. This benefit is also extended to students from other departments who have opted NSDC-certified add-on/ certificate courses offered by THM department. In addition to earning a reasonable amount, the scheme gives students an opportunity for industry exposure and experiential learning.

Earn While You Learn (EWYL)

EWYL is a government funded novel project launched by the higher education department in the academic year 2021-22 to inculcate love for work and to foster employability skills among students by giving them the opportunity to undertake various works related to the institution they study in and getting reasonably paid for the work. As part of the program, students who have skills in works like data entry, painting, plumbing, gardening, wiring . photography etc are identified and assigned works for which they get a fixed amount per hour. The scheme has the double benefit of helping students earn while they are learning to meet their needs and getting many works completed in a timely manner.

Embase Pro Suit

EMBASE Pro Suit a highly customized software pack which eases the

administration of an educational institution by bringing a number of services and utilities to a single platform. It covers admission, fee collection, accounting, students' management, staff management, attendance entry, library book management, admin-parent communications, tutors- parent communications, emergency notifications, live interactions, certificate generations and many more. The college has purchased this pack to make its administrative and academic services run smoothly and effectively.

WE WITH YOU

There are hundreds of people around us whose financial condition is not as good as ours. WE With You is a Gasckian initiative to help the needy students in the college to excel in their studies by collecting funds from our own students and teachers. In the beginning of the academic year, the class tutors/mentors shortlist the neediest students from their class and forward the list to the project coordinator. After ensuring eligibility of the students for the help, different kinds of support are extended to students to meet their academic needs.

WiFi-Enabled Campus

The college provides wireless internet access throughout the institution, allowing students and faculty to connect to the internet from anywhere on campus.

COMPUTER LAB & SOFT LAB

The computer lab is equipped to open the window towards the horizon of information technology. It has facility to meet the needs of students who learn computer science or IT courses in different departments. Free Wi-Fi is provided in the computer lab.

ORICE

Expanded as Online Resource Initiative of Collegiate Education (ORICE), is a programme of the Department of Collegiate Education, Govt. Of Kerala. The programme envisages that each college constitutes a full-fledged spacious room cum studio, which is suitable for the conduct of online classes, video conferences, and content dissemination and preparation. The project aims:

It is constituted to provide protection against sexual harassment of women at workplace and is bound to take steps to prevent occurrence of any such event. The committee also deal with redressal mechanism if any such case is reported. The ICC at the college consists of representatives from female teachers, administrative staff and girl students. IQAC

Internal Quality Assurance Cell , a body proposed by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC), is perceived as a mechanism to build and ensure a quality culture at the institutional level. The department offers undergraduate programme Bachelor of Tourism and Hotel Management (BTHM) with FRENCH as the second language. The sanctioned intake is 24 students. The department mainly aims to incubate the students who wish to see their career in Tourism and Hospitality industry. The department aims at equipping the learners with the theory, practical and the right attitude to be a hotelier, tour provider, travel assistant and other related positions in the Tourism and Hospitality industry.

VISION

To be an exceptional centre of Tourism and Hospitality education by moulding the students to become great professionals and innovative entrepreneurs.

MISSION

- ◆ To develop quality human resources in Tourism and Hospitality with adequate knowledge, skills and attitude.
- ◆ To prepare the students for employment and entrepreneurial opportunities by way of theoretical knowledge and practical training.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

BTHM (Bachelor of Tourism and Hotel Management) is a 4 year undergraduate (UG) program. The program consists of Eight semesters distributed over a period of 4 academic years. The courses are divided into four categories that are Common Course, Core Course, Complementary course and open course. Practical orientations to Food production, Food and Beverage Service, Accommodation Operation and Front office operation are the main attractions of this programme. After second semester every student has to go for one month Industrial exposure Training either at Travel Agency or Airport and after fourth semester every student has to go for five month industrial exposure training at Hotels. During the six semesters, students have to do a project. The programme also includes industrial visits to reputed Hotels. During the third or Fourth semester the students have to undertake a study tour of not less than seven days.

BTHM, being a professional program, has the following segments:

Classroom Learning: Theoretical sessions.

Practical lab sessions: Front Office, Food Production, F&B Service, and Housekeeping Operations.

Learning from the field: Industrial visit in the first year, Study tour in the second year to learn about tour operation.

Learning by Doing: One month Travel / Tourism internship training in the second year; and 20 weeks long Industrial Exposure Training (IET) in 5 star hotels/resorts in the 5th semester.

FACILITIES

1. Food Production Laboratory: The Food production lab has facilities like kitchen work stations, Oven, LPG bank, and other equipments and utensils used in hotels, where students are trained as professional chefs.

2. F&B Service Laboratory: This lab trains the students in different styles of Food and Beverage Service.

3. Front Office and Housekeeping Lab: This lab trains the students for Front office Procedures and Housekeeping operation methods.

UNIFORM

The students have two sets of Uniforms. Formal wear with black suit coat and pants, formal white full sleeve shirt, tie and formal black shoes is worn on Mondays and Thursdays. Chef uniform with safety boots is to be worn on days of Food production practical.

It is divided in to eight semesters. In each semester students have to learn 5 courses along with a dissertation in the sixth semester. The program consists of core, complementary, elective and common courses which are designed to meet specific learning objectives/outcomes. In the end of each Semester, University conducts the end Semester Examinations and the results are published in due time.

Though a major share of the courses taught is somewhat related to English literature, the program's orientations include practical communication skills, media studies/journalism, ELT, Business English and content writing.

FEES

RULES FOR ISSUING TRANSFER CERTIFICATE

No transfer certificate will be issued to those from whom there are any dues to the college. No fee will be levied from those who apply for T.C. within one year after leaving the college. A fee of Rs. 50 will be levied from those who apply for T.C. after the lapse of one year from the date of leaving the college. An additional fee of ` 100 will be levied from those who apply for duplicate copy of the T.C. with the recommendation of the First Class Magistrate.

Every student should take his/her T.C at the end of his/her course and produce it when he/she is admitted for the next course.

COLLEGE LIBRARY RULES

The General library is sub-divided into:

Reference library

Lending library

Reference library - Books in the reference library and books which are rare and out of print are intended for reference and consultation only within the library and reading room. These shall not be removed from the library except with the special sanction of the Principal.

Lending Library - The issue of books from the lending library will be governed by the following rules:

- i. Each student is allowed to take two books at a time from the lending library.
- ii. No book shall be kept for more than fifteen days by a borrower. If the books is not returned when due or called for, a fine of Rs.1.00 per day of default will be levied.

- iii. The Principal may recall any book loaned to a student at any time.
- iv. All markings, under linings etc., in the books are punishable with a fine or with replacement. Books should be returned intact.
- v. The students must satisfy himself as to whether book issued to him is in sound condition and if it is not, bring the matter to the notice of the Librarian. For all damages to books noticed at the time of their return to the library, the borrower will be held responsible and he will have to pay the cost of replacement along with fine levied by the Principal.
- vi. If a book is lost by the borrower he/she must pay the cost of replacement together with any fine that the Principal may impose upon him/her.
- vii. All books taken by the teaching and non-teaching staff are to be returned in time for the annual stock verification.

IDENTITY CARD

Identity cards will be issued to the students at the time of admission. The card should be kept carefully and the same should be in possession whenever a student is inside the college campus and produce whenever demanded by any member of the staff. Duplicate identity card will be issued only in exceptional cases on payment of a fine of Rs.55.

ATTENDANCE AND LEAVE

1. Every student shall put in a minimum attendance of 75% of term days.
2. The college shall put in a minimum of 180 working days exclusive of examination days.
3. No student shall be absent from the College without leave application. Where absence is due to unforeseen causes, the application for leave must be made as soon as possible and in no case later than the first day of return to the college.
4. All applications for leave from students will be entertained only if they are recommended by the Tutors concerned. The application should be accompanied by Medical Certificates if the absence is due to illness for more than 5 working days.
5. Students who absent themselves for one hour during the morning session will be reckoned as absent for half a day and similarly for the afternoon.

6. If a student is absent without leave for a month his/her name may be struck off from the rolls unless the Principal is satisfied that the failure to apply for leave was due to unavoidable reasons.
7. The Semester end Attendance Progress Certificate (APC) for admission to the University Examination will in no case be granted unless the student's progress and conduct have been satisfactory and unless the student has attended at least 75% of the total working days.

GENERAL CODE OF ETHICS

- ◆ Students have to keep the identity card and college Calendar with them always and produce the identity card when demand by the college authorities.
- ◆ Perfect discipline and decorum should be maintained in the class rooms and in the college campus
- ◆ Do not enter or leave a class in session without the permission of the teacher.
- ◆ Students shall not smoke, chew pan in the premises of the college. Do not participate in
 - o any agitation directed against constituted authority
 - o any meeting likely to excite disloyalty or disaffection; towards the Government
 - o any movement likely to promote communal ill-feeling
- ◆ Do not disfigure college walls, desks or benches with writing or engravings of any description. Students shall not loiter through the corridors or along the verandahs during class hours
- ◆ No meeting or entertainment shall be organized or any fund collected in the College without the permission of the Principal
- ◆ Students who go over to other college or institutions to take part in acts of indiscipline such as demonstration or strikes will be punished.
- ◆ The dress worn shall always be clean, sober and dignified. All should observe strict modesty in dress and manners
- ◆ Students should take note of the notifications put on the notice boards every day before they leave the college. Failure to look at the notice board will not be an excuse for any omission or commission.
- ◆ In regard to all matters of conduct in and outside the college not

specially mentioned herein, staff and students are expected to conduct themselves in such a way as to maintain the fair name of the college as well as their own.

- ◆ The Principal shall have the power to inflict the following punishments: fine, cancellation of attendance, forfeiture of educational concession and scholarship, suspension, compulsory issue of T. C. etc.
- ◆ Promotion to higher class, selection for University Examination and issue of progress, attendance or conduct certificates are matters absolutely within the discretion of the Principal.
- ◆ Irregular attendance, insubordination to teachers, habitual inattention to class work, obscenity in word or act are sufficient reasons for punishment measures.
- ◆ Staff and students shall not misuse cell phones in the class room.
- ◆ Two-wheelers and Four wheelers shall be parked only at the parking area.

GRIVENCE REDRESSAL POLICY

Government Arts and Science College Kondotty (GASCK) is committed to providing a safe, inclusive, and respectful learning environment for all its students. This policy aims to establish a transparent and efficient mechanism for addressing grievances related to ragging, sexual harassment, and other student-related issues. The college upholds the principles of natural justice and ensures that all complaints are handled with sensitivity, impartiality, and confidentiality.

Objectives

- ◆ To create a safe and secure environment free from ragging, sexual harassment, and other forms of harassment or discrimination.
- ◆ To provide a fair and accessible grievance redressal mechanism for students.
- ◆ To ensure timely and effective resolution of student grievances.
- ◆ To promote awareness about student rights and responsibilities.
- ◆ To uphold the principles of natural justice and ensure confidentiality.
- ◆ To comply with all relevant laws and regulations, including but not limited to:
- ◆ UGC Regulations on Curbing the Menace of Ragging in Higher Educational Institutions, 2009 (and subsequent amendments).

- ◆ The Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013.
- ◆ Any other applicable state or national legislation.

Scope

- ◆ This policy applies to all students of College and covers grievances related to:
- ◆ Ragging (physical, verbal, or psychological).
- ◆ Sexual harassment (including unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal or physical harassment of a sexual nature).
- ◆ Discrimination based on caste, creed, religion, gender, sexual orientation, disability, or any other protected characteristic.
- ◆ Academic grievances (e.g., examination issues, unfair evaluation).
- ◆ Administrative grievances (e.g., issues with library, hostel, or other facilities).
- ◆ Any other student-related issues that affect their well-being and academic progress.

Grievance Redressal Mechanism:

The college has the following bodies to handle student grievances:

Anti-Ragging Committee:

Composition: As per UGC regulations, including faculty members, administrative staff, student representatives, and representatives from NGOs.

Responsibilities: To investigate and address complaints of ragging, conduct awareness programs, and take disciplinary action against those found guilty.

Internal Complaints Committee (ICC):

Composition: As per the Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013, including a presiding officer (woman faculty member), faculty members, non-teaching employees, and an external member from an NGO.

Responsibilities: To investigate and address complaints of sexual harassment, provide counseling, and recommend disciplinary action.

Student Grievance Redressal Cell (SGRC):

Composition: Faculty members, student representatives, and relevant administrative staff.

Responsibilities: To address other student-related grievances, including academic and administrative issues.

Procedure for Filing a Grievance:

- ◆ A student can file a grievance in writing (including email) or orally to any member of the relevant committee or the Ombudsperson.
- ◆ The grievance should include the student's name, contact information, a detailed description of the incident, and any supporting evidence.
- ◆ The student can also file an anonymous complaint, but this may limit the scope of the investigation.
- ◆ Online Grievance portal is also provided.

Procedure for Redressal:

- ◆ The relevant committee will acknowledge the grievance within two days.
- ◆ A preliminary inquiry will be conducted to determine the validity of the grievance.
- ◆ If the grievance is found to be valid, a formal investigation will be initiated.
- ◆ The student and the accused will be given an opportunity to present their case.
- ◆ The committee will conduct a fair and impartial investigation, maintaining confidentiality.
- ◆ The committee will submit a report with its findings and recommendations to the Principal/Director.
- ◆ The Principal/Director will take appropriate action based on the recommendations, which may include disciplinary action, counseling, or other remedial measures.
- ◆ The student will be informed of the outcome of the grievance.
- ◆ Appeals can be made to the Ombudsperson.

Confidentiality:

- ◆ All grievances and investigations will be treated with strict confidentiality.
- ◆ The identity of the complainant and the accused will be protected, except when disclosure is necessary for the investigation or legal

proceedings.

- ◆ Records of all grievances and investigations will be maintained securely.

Awareness and Prevention:

- ◆ The college will conduct regular awareness programs on ragging, sexual harassment, and other student-related issues.
- ◆ The college will display posters and distribute pamphlets about the grievance redressal policy.
- ◆ The college will include information about the grievance redressal mechanism in the student handbook and website.
- ◆ The college will conduct regular workshops and seminars to promote a safe and respectful campus environment.

CODE OF CONDUCT FOR STUDENTS

- ◆ Be punctual, regular and responsible learners
- ◆ Be modest in your dressing, manners and appearance
- ◆ Never involve yourself in any form of activities amounting to ragging
- ◆ Be respectful and modest in your behavior
- ◆ Abstain from all kinds of malpractices in examination
- ◆ Keep the classrooms and campus clean and tidy
- ◆ Maintain discipline on the campus
- ◆ Wear ID tags while on the campus
- ◆ Handle institutional properties with care
- ◆ Uphold academic integrity and develop passion for learning
- ◆ Observe the rules and regulations of the college
- ◆ Check the college website/notice board regularly

TUTORIAL / MENTORING SYSTEM

- 1) Each teacher will be in charge of a batch of students.
- 2) Students are encouraged to consult his/her tutor/mentor on all matters pertaining to academic life and studies.
- 3) The tutors/mentors are expected to have intimate knowledge of their ward, the circumstances and ways of their life, from frequent personal interaction.
- 4) The Tutors/mentors are expected to have frequent contacts with

their ward, during and outside college hours and to report any remission in their progress and conduct immediately it is noticed, so that the Principal may bring the fact to the notice of their guardians or parents in time and take suitable action.

STANDARD OPERATING PROCEDURE (SOP)

As a part of a series of initiatives to improve the quality and standard of the college, we have formulated a Standard Operating Procedure for various communications and activities between various stakeholders of the college. SOP will ensure that files and communication move through proper channel and reach the right authority. The SOP is a guide to all stakeholders to access various services from the college. CLUBS, FORUMS AND ASSOCIATIONS

The works and activities of the various clubs and associations in the college help to maintain a productive co-scholastic environment on the campus. There are mainly 5 associations in the college namely, the Functional English, the Commerce, the Mathematics, the Urdu and the Tourism and Hotel Management Associations. The different clubs/forums working in the campus help to keep the campus life busy and active. The main clubs are:

TOURISM CLUB

Tourism club functioning under the department of tourism and hotel management, aims to promote tourism and hospitality among the students of the college. It encourages activities related to nature, outdoor events, conservations, responsibility and sustainability of tourism products. Nature Club functions as a dedicated service programme to create awareness among students, faculty and staff about nature and related issues. It aims at bringing together nature lovers for promoting, monitoring and operating environmental and sustainable activities in and around the campus and for the society. To realize this goal, the Alumni involves in or organizes social welfare activities, financial assistance, career guidance and orientation for higher studies.

STAFF CLUB

The college staff club consists of all teaching and non-teaching staff and is a platform for creating a better work environment and strengthening mutual rapport among the staff. The club celebrates special occasions like Onam, Christmas, Eid etc, extends financial support to students and the needy, arranges recreational events, feasts, trips and also acts a strong agent to ensure the smooth functioning of the college. The staff club secretary and other members are selected in the beginning of each academic year.

FAIR

The Forum for Active Involvement in Research (FAIR) is a venture of the department of English for catering to the needs and aspirations of both student and teaching communities in terms of research. It functions as a platform to disseminate novel ideas, share one's perspectives regarding the emerging trends in language, literature, literary and cultural theory, ELT, cultural studies and translation studies. FAIR conducts scholarly paper presentation sessions on the last Monday of every month. The presentation is followed by discussions, queries, and intellectual deliberations to ensure the active involvement of each participant.

PACE

Platform for Accelerating Communicative in English (PACE) is an initiative of the Department of English. Being situated in a rural locality, majority of the student community of the college belongs to socially underprivileged sections. One major hurdle that impedes the educational and career related growth of the students and other stakeholders of the college is their poor communication skills in English language. PACE tries to address this challenge by organizing

diverse programs like Speaking Drills, Vocabulary Quizzes, Elocution Competitions, and Basic Grammar Sessions for better communication skills.

COLLEGE COUSSELLING CELL/JEEVANI

CCS/Jeevani Initiative provides a happy and comfortable environment for students to discuss their problems regarding their academic and social life. The cell also provides individual counselling sessions, motivational talks, interactive sessions, psychiatry and therapy sessions to help the students deal with mental stress and allied issues. This centre for mental wellbeing tries to mitigate students' stress, help them reach appropriate solutions, guides them to take responsible decisions, and enables them to become self-actualized individuals.

LTTL

Learn to Teach and Teach to Learn (LTTL) is another innovative scheme in the college in which students who have a flavor for teaching, preferably PG students, are given chances to teach UG students in the college. The scheme aims at honing the pedagogic skills of prospective teachers by providing them chances to practice theoretical concepts they learn in the classroom. In addition, it promotes concept of peer teaching and remedial learning. The scheme occasionally undertakes extension activities involving teaching and training school students in the neighbourhood by students from various departments from the college.

ELF

English Literary Forum is a platform for students of the department (with minimal teacherly supervision) for enhancing their literary potentials, language skills, creative writing abilities etc. It organizes diverse activities such as a regular weekly gathering, welcome party, farewell party etc. and occasionally guest talks, presentation sessions, postgraduate seminars, workshops etc. The membership is open to all the students in the department and each member is expected to strictly attend, and actively contribute to all the ELF sessions including the regular sessions on Wednesdays (2.30 p.m. - 3.30 p.m.)

URDU WRITERS FORUM

It is a forum formulated with the aim of developing the skills of creative writing among the students. The forum has been active since 2018-19 academic year. It conducts various programs and competitions

like presentations, discussions , workshops with specific focus on writing abilities and creative talents. Mrs. Rasiya TP, is the faculty in charge of the forum.

GHAZAL CLUB

This club has been actively functioning in the department since the academic year 2018-19. Its main purpose is to develop the musical skills of students to sing urdu kawalies and gazals. The club also aims at developing better Urdu communication skills among the students. Mushairas, Ghazal Singing Competitions etc. The in charge of the forum is Mrs. Mumthaz CH, Asst. Professor of Urdu.

Sci Pi Club

Sci- Pi , the Mathematics club was started in the college on 23-09-2015 with the aim of promoting cross- curricular thinking and holistic development of students .It also aims to stimulate mathematical curiosity and a positive attitude towards Mathematics . All UG & PG students were members of the club by default.

It also gives such students an opportunity for experiential learning with financial benefits by engaging in leading five-star hotels and other premium hospitality and event management firms.

Magamalar-a Cultural Club

Department of Tourism and Hotel Management formed a club for all students at the college with the interest and intention of showcasing and encouraging cultural activities like music, dance, artwork and other extraordinary stage performances.

GASCK Creativity Fest (GCF)

GCF is a collaborative effort of the institution that stems from the ideals of the creative solidarity of the learners, faculty members and the larger public. Originally devised as a part of the decennial celebrations of the College, the fest has now become a landmark of the creative venture of the institution. It visualises a platform for exhibiting the latent aesthetic talents and opens a wider spectrum for discussion on art and culture. The discourse surrounding the Fest triggers positive thought process on the learners and gradually equips them to be

democratic members of the community at large. The primary aims of the Creativity Fest range from in-depth discussions, critical analyses to the individual performances leading to group dynamics in our public systems of life. The first edition of the Fest titled 'Sarga' was successfully organised by the learning community in 2023. Diverse cultural sessions were displayed by the learners in the campus followed by various individual sessions from the public. Science Exhibition, Food Expo, theatre and martial performances were the highlights of the day. One of the major attractions of the first edition was its inclusion of the local artists in the forum and debate session.

GLOW

GLOW is the name of a project initiated as a part of the decennial celebrations of Government Arts and Science College, Kondotty. The project has been designed so as to ensure basic mathematical and linguistic skills in students. As a part of the project, a system of testing was developed which was administered to the students of lower primary classes in the neighborhood of the college. Students thus shortlisted are given classes during weekends and public holidays. A team of students selected from the college are the student tutors. The project holds the very noble vision that every student should be equipped with the basic linguistic and mathematical skills before entering the upper primary level.

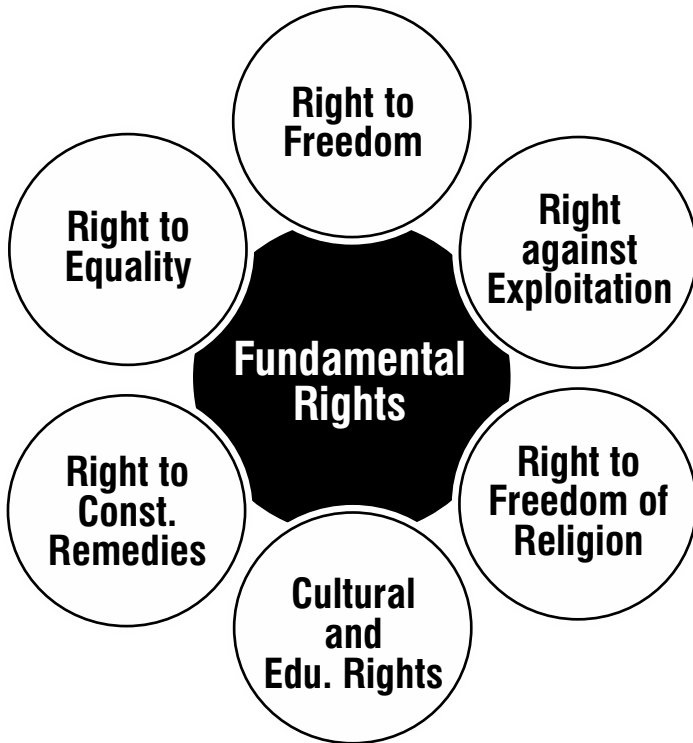
